### "City of Richmond Update" ISIAH TURNER City Manager

Isiah Turner brings 30 years of experience to his current job as City Manager for the City of Richmond where he manages 1,200 employees.

Under his leadership in Richmond, unprecedented successful collaboration among public agencies, community-based organizations, labor, education and the business community has occurred. This has resulted in thousands of jobs for Richmond residents and an increased tax base for the City's general fund. He is currently leading an ambitious economic development program that will create 4,000 new jobs; the building of 3,000 new homes ranging from \$170,000 to \$600,000; a transit village in the heart of old downtown Richmond; the revitalization of the old Ford Building; the start up of a new ferry service; and the creation of three retail/commercial centers in the Hilltop area, in the Marina area and in the Richmond Annex area.

He has hired the first black police chief and the first black recreation and parks director in the city's history. He also promoted a black woman to the position of employment and training director, and promoted a black man to interim fire chief; both are Richmond residents. As far as increasing revenues for the city, under his leadership \$5.4 million in Department of Labor funds have been obtained and over \$10 million in Housing Urban Development funds have been obtained this past year.

By far, his biggest accomplishment has been that he has been able to work productively with the mayor and eight council members, and he continues to be accessible and very visible in community activities and events.


#### Election:

#### "Richmond Art Center"

STEPHANIE JUNO Director of Education

Stephanie Juno has served as the Director of Education since April of 1999. She comes to the Richmond Art Center with ten years of experience in the arts as an instructor, program designer, director and artist. As an instructor, she has taught a wide range of art media including drawing, painting, sculpture, installation, performance, animation, video, book-making, and creative writing. Her students have ranged in age from 3 to 75 and she has taught energetically at museums, community centers and universities alike including the San Diego Museum of Art, Tribal School of Barona, CA, and the University of Santa Barbara. As a program designer, Stephanie has created custom-designed, innovative programs such as schoolwide integrated artist residencies, creativity seminars for corporations, and education outreach for public art projects. For five years, Stephanie directed the 4d Institute for the Arts which was founded to promote inter-disciplinary art at the grass-roots level. She also co-directed the program, Zero to One, a mentorship program dedicated to nurturing emerging artists through guidance by established professional artists. As an artist herself, Stephanie has exhibited her interdisciplinary work nationally and in Canada at over 50 shows since 1989 at venues including the Museum of Modern Art, Hallwalls and PS122 in New York, Los Angeles Contemporary Exhibitions (LACE), and Banff Centre for the Arts in Alberta, Canada.



he was moving his membership from Richmond to Orinda, but pleased to know that in his heart he will always be a Richmond Rotarian.


Program: JEFF NATHANSON, the day's program director, re-introduced Isiah Turner, Richmond City Manager, who had addressed Richmond Rotary about 16 months ago. JEFF outlined several of Mr. Turner's accomplishments since he became City Manager in May of 1998, but the work of which he is proudest is finding new and exciting ways to form a productive partnership with the Mayor and ALL eight members of the City Council.

Mr. Turner reported that when he took office he found a City lacking a sense of direction. Working closely with the City Council and members of his senior managerial staff, a mission, vision and values were identified. Using the mission and values for guidance, a set of goals has been identified for implementation by mid-2001.

Richmond is now seen as a prime spot for community and residential development. Approximately 3,000 new housing units are either under construction or soon will be. Several new companies have been attracted to Richmond including Grace Baking, Allen Ritchie and a major player in the communications industry. The City has entered into a public/private partnership for the operation of the City's marina. These new companies will help to upgrade Richmond's financial stability, but not entirely. Richmond is a full service city and as such has a broader array of services to offer and a higher level of expectations to meet than other cities in CCC. Over the next several months, a City-wide survey will be undertaken in order to ascertain priorities for review and

repair. Examples of work to be done include but are not limited to: The City's infrastructure long-standing need for modernization; part of the City continue to need a permanent removal replaced by an on-going sense of community pride; outstanding safety issues continue to hamper the City's ability to grow and prosper; and the City's role in working with the County to improve the unincorporated area known as North Richmond is ongoing. He indicated that the full scale undertaking to bring about these long needed improvements will cost hundreds of millions of dollars and involve the good work and good will of everyone in Richmond.

#### Congressman George Miller

U.S. Representative George Miller, a leading spokesman on the environment, children and families, has represented the 7th District of California in San Francisco's East Bay since 1975. His district includes portions of Contra Costa County and Solano County, including the cities of Richmond, Concord, Martinez, Pittsburg, Vallejo and Benicia.

As vice-chairman of the House Democratic Policy Committee, senior Democrat on the House Resources Committee, and the second most senior Democrat on the House Education and the Workforce Committee, Mr. Miller is responsible for developing policy positions on a wide array of issues for the Democratic Caucus, covering social, economic, foreign and environmental policy.

Congressman Miller's legislative priorities now include: improving student achievement by raising the quality of teachers and holding schools and students accountable to higher standards; campaign finance reform; ending child labor and sweatshops, both in the U.S. and abroad, including in the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands, a U.S. territory; eliminating unjustified and environmentally damaging natural resource subsidies; and preserving and expanding environmental resources such as urban parks and open space, national parks, coastal and marine wildlife and historic buildings.

For 10 years, Mr. Miller has led the effort to clear the names of the Port Chicago "Mutineers", 50 black sailors from WWII who refused to resume loading munitions at the Port Chicago Naval Weapons Station in Concord, following a still unexplained explosion that killed 320 sailors in 1944, most of whom were black. Mr. Miller, working with historians, journalists and the sailors themselves, helped demonstrate that racism played a strong role in their courts martial and that their convictions should be overturned.

Mr. Miller has helped cities and counties in his congressional district secure federal funding for transportation, economic development, housing, mental health treatment, crime prevention and the conversion of the now-closed Mare Island Naval Shipyard.

She also revealed that the Center provide artists for a twelve week residency in a school classroom. The school pays about a third of the cost of the program, about \$1,000. Rhetorically she asked, "Why artists in the schools?" The Carnegie Institute has found, she stated, that students who do art in school do better academically, exhibit more leadership skills and self-esteem, and have a higher rate of attending college. Children today have not had the exposure to art, that we of the older generation had, and they are in fact often "scared" of art. Program: DAVID BROWN gave a warm left-leaning intro to the Honorable GEORGE MILLER who has been this district's Gongressman ever since DAVID can remember. Congressman Miller, who was born in Richmond, showed the extent of his knowledge about Richmond and the region he serves. He spoke at great length about the challenges of improving our educational system, praising superintendent of schools GLORIA JOHNSTON and the work Richmond Rotary is doing in the local schools --especially Peres. He was right on when he said that "kids need a big dose of community involvement". As Senior Democrat on the education committee he will become chair of that committee if the Democrats become the majority party in the next election. He discussed his desire that every classroom have a

qualified teacher. As it is now, many schools will take anybody who is willing to go into a classroom regardless of their qualifications. As a result, poor schools with poor students have poor teachers and this equals a poor education.

There was no question of the Congressman's politics as he discussed the GOP's trillion dollar tax cut proposal. It is remarkable how large the state's and national surplus is - and how the surplus continues to grow. It is the longest and most prosperous financial recovery in modern history, but the rich are getting richer and the gap between the haves and have nots is growing. Social Security, health care and education are all important topics he discussed in terms of the growing national surplus. As Congressman Miller described it, the goal of federal funding historically has been to close the gap between the rich and poor, majority and minorities. He plans to focus on this to help all students gain a better education and ultimately a fighting chance for a better life in America.

The Congressman closed with a "promise" for a full, productive and harmonious Congress. The question and answer session that followed had a number of good discussions regarding MTBE's; debt reduction vs. education reform and health care.

#### **New Members:**



DAVID BROWN introduced Gary Sloan who is Executive Director of Doctor's Medical Center in Pinole and San Pablo.

Mr. Sloan stated that in the last two years, thanks to the merger of the Doctor's Medical Center in Pinole and the former Brookside Hospital in San Pablo, medical care in West County has improved.

There have been significant improvements at the former Brookside Hospital including a full service cardiac lab, a more inclusive ob-gyn clinic, one of the outstanding cancer treatment centers in the Bay Area and an expanded emergency room. Through the synergy between the two hospitals, the hope of bringing greater efficiencies in hospital management and patient care is in hand. The Tenet Corporation, which oversees the hospitals, has made a \$20 million investment towards the improvements.

Despite these upgrades, Mr. Sloan pointed out medical services in West County continues to be presented with significant challenges. Among these:

The efficacy of emergency room services operation from San Pablo in lieu of both San Pablo and Pinole. Moving an intensive care unit from Pinole to San San Pablo.

The relationship (or lack of one) of both hospitals with Kaiser Medical Services.

The incredible confusion that exists concerning insurance coverages for everyone, but especially senior citizens which was summed up very well in a short story conveyed by Gary Sloan.

Finding ways of maintaining sound finances while continuing to meet unfunded mandates.

Community education programs to develop a better informed public about health care in general and hospital services in particular.

Richmond Rotary appreciates the hard work Mr. Sloan and wishes him well.

#### Program:

JOE GREEN introduced Brian Elliott who is Vice-President for Alibris, Inc. Alibris, Inc. is a relatively new company that deals exclusively on the Internet. Its focus is the purchase and sale of used and hard to find books to individuals, libraries, corporations and bookstores.

Brian pointed out that at any given time there are approximately 500,000 books in print. Anyone who wants to acquire one of those titles will have an easy time locating and buying the book. The item can be found in many bookstores, catalogs and the Internet. However, if the book is no longer in print, finding the book would



have been difficult were it not for Alibris. Alibris acts as an agent for the secondary book market for a wide variety of books. The aspect of the service that is new is that the Internet acts as the intermediary in locating the hard to find book. What once was difficult is now easy! Brian Elliott's job is to bring together various companies that are involved in bookselling and tie them to Alibris' strengths. Companies such a Amazon or Borders work with Alibris in delivering out of print books to their customers. An individual will locate a book at the library or a catalog or a recommendation and will want to buy it only to learn that it is rare or out of print. By turning to a wide variety of book selling outlets, the individual can order as though the piece were readily available. The order will be turned over to Alibris which will locate it, ship it and bill it through its partners. This kind of activity has been made possible through the Internet with its worldwide reach.

Alibris' organization represents the new virtual office with its corporate operation in Emeryville, its library division in Oregon, its top executive staff in Seattle and its warehouse in Sparks, Nevada. The company is comprised of about 80 individuals all working in tandem thanks to the 'net. A process that previously could take weeks to complete can now provide a guaranteed turnaround time of 24 hours.

Although books are the most heavily currently sold item on the Internet, Brian sees Internet commerce growing incrementally - especially in those areas that require intensive labor to locate rare materials. He also sees the Internet as the means for blending more and more of companies into seamless streams of commerce. The secondary market for books represents a multi-billion enterprise that will grow to its greatest value on the Internet. Despite the increase in trade, Brian shared the advice of his boss, "If you want to make a small fortune in the book business, start with a large fortune."

When asked if the Internet will replace books or libraries, Brian said that the future of the book is safe the idea of using the laptop for storytelling time is really unappealing; computer aided recreational reading at the beach is a gritty proposition; and history has taught us that the book is the preferred method for communication. The likelihood of changing computers for books remains questionable. Anyone who thinks we are moving to a paperless society should take a look at his/her desk.



Guests: GEORGE EGAN introduced his guest Bette Boaten who was recently elected Vice-President of the Association of California Water Authorities.


#### Announcements:

LESLIE LEVY introduced our speaker for the day, Christopher Springmann, Mr. Springmann is a well known photographer/writer. At the age of 21, he photographed the war in Viet-nam for Time magazine. He has photographed Presidents including John F. Kennedy. Georgia O'Keefe was one of his subjects and he has photographed numerous titans in the business world.

One of his most recent pieces was a feature story in Parade magazine. The article concerned Dr. Ernie Bodai who almost single handedly brought the Breast Cancer Research stamp to America. Christopher Springmann impressed upon his audience the concept of random creativity which takes a simple concept and grows it exponentially. Dr. Bodai, a cancer specialist in Sacramento, wanted to do something about the limited funding that breast cancer research receives. In a random act of creativity, he thought that if the United States Postal Service were simply to add a small surcharge on a stamp for breast cancer research that funds collected by the sale of that stamp could be used solely to increase funding for research. That random act grew into a huge learning experience for Dr. Bodai. To be successful, Dr. Bodai's creativity would require an act of the U.S. Congress. Some of the things that Dr. Bodai learned included the following:

· "Not invented here", "you are on my turf", and "who died and made you God" are creativity killers that are all part of the cancer prevention world and get in the way

of progress towards a cure. Dr. Bodai's answer is that he may not be God, but he was named God's messenger in working toward the cure for breast cancer. Adversaries are simply people not yet onboard.

· Whenever Dr. Bodai felt angered or annoyed by negative reaction to his proposal, he remembered to turn that anger into creative action and to check his ego at the door so that he would not trip over it.

 If one person is willing to put all that he or she holds dear and valuable on the line, that one person can achieve what originally appeared to be only a dream. Dr. Bodai's journey defines personal courage.

· Random acts of creativity result in developing a creative culture that will lead to turning one's dreams into reality. Ernie Bodai's dream became his vision which became our reality. The Postal Office printed 200 million stamps in the initial phase of what is described as an experimental program. The "experiment" resulted in a complete sale of all stamps.

Mr. Springmann's wonderful photographs of Dr. Bodai's patients and allies brightened his inspirational story.

Christopher Spingmann works each day in the very broad field of photography which clearly is an area ripe for creative endeavors. Yet, it is the small random acts of creativity that inspire him and that will inspire us as

JOHN M. STARR JOEL GOLUB DAN O'MALLEY

John Starr has lived in Contra Costa County since 1964. He is married and has two adult daughters. Mr. Starr worked in the Contra Costa County DA's office from 1970 until 1974. Since 1974, he has been in private practice representing businessmen, corporations and individuals in matters relating to real estate sales, construction and liability. He has served as a judge pro tem, arbitrator, mediator and settlement commissioner, and has completed over 100 jury trials.

Joel Golub was in private practice in San Francisco from 1980 to 1993, and has worked as a Hearing Officer for Alameda County Superior Court from 1991-1993. He has served as a judge pro tem in San Francisco, Alameda and Marin counties. He currently works as a Commissioner of the Superior Court of Contra Costa County, at the Walnut Creek courthouse. Mr. Golub teaches at JFK School of Law and has taught at the CJER Judicial Studies Program, SFSU, USF and other schools.

Dan O'Malley has lived in Contra Costa County all his life. He is married and has two sons. Mr. O'Malley has worked for the Contra Costa County District Attorney's office since 1987. He has worked in the White Collar Crime, Homicide, Three Strikes and Juvenile Units and as a supervisor in Homicide and Misdemeanors. CHARLIE FENDER was sad about the tank job that Cal performed versus Stanford. Nevertheless, CHARLIE could be happy that Cal did make history in basketball annals. Father CHRIS WOERZ pointed out that although priests do not marry, they do celebrate anniversaries. CHRIS was pleased to announce that he had just completed 24 years as a priest. He also is very happy about the successful fund raising for new athletic facilities at Salesian. DAVID BROWN had sad dollars because of the way El Cerrito Honda's application was received and treated by the City of Richmond. DONNA BELL had a particular bright smile at this meeting. Her braces are gone! DAVID K., REN PARTRIDGE and MIKE WINTERS were dining in the big people's room at the Mira Vista courtesy of the Pacific Security Real Estate. Many Rotarians felt this slight was finable to the tune of the cost of the weekly lunch at Rotary. These three (3) big wheel realtors now owe Rotary \$11 each for their snub. Judge JONI HIRAMOTO felt that the three perpetrators should have a chance to appeal the charge especially in light of the fact that the charge was rendered in absentia. #### Program:

Brian Pretti is Vice-President in the Investments Office of Mechanics Bank. This was Brian's third visit with Richmond Rotary. Many Rotarians look forward to his



investments. Brian pointed out that this rip-roaring economy was creating unheard of opportunities for long term, prudent investors. A real split is developing between those who view the stock market from a broad perspective to those who take advantage of a narrow line of companies primarily in the technology field. This change has created a huge market of undervalued properties and this is a wonderful time to take advantage by buying stocks at bargain basement prices.

Bank of America, which is now merged with NationsBank, is once again one of America's largest banks. The company is finding ways to improve its price/earnings ratio as well as reducing risks of its assets. The current price of the stock is down by about 1/3 from September, 1999, and for one who is looking for a worthwhile investment over the next 3 to 5 years. BofA could be a good choice. Because "everybody's got to eat", an investment in Safeway is another of Mr. Pretti's recommendations. Safeway is a well managed organization that is beginning to reassert itself as a market leader, especially in the sales area. Brian sees Safeway stock having significant earnings power over the next 3 to 4 years. He compared Safeway with Internet grocer Webvan which Brian predicts will file for bankruptcy while Safeway continues to take market share. Pharmaceutical giants Merck, Pfizer, and Johnson&Johnson are three undervalued stocks that dominate their respective market. Price/earnings is steady despite the reduced price of the stock. Both companies produce products that overwhelm competition

marketing similar drugs. Brian sees that dominance continuing for the next few years. With the steady growth of American's real estate market, Washington Mutual's profitability from home lending should grow. That growth should lead to a net advance of the value of the stock. Washington Mutual is an attractive company for corporate takeover which could increase its stock value. Lucent Technology, well known for its research capabilities, stands on the forefront of the next wave of exciting technology stocks. Brian reports that there are three basic modes of communication - electric, digital and optical. Lucent is the leader in the optical field and with the advent of optical's growth in technology, this undervalued stock should do well as a growth asset.

Some of Brian's other recommendations are: Long's Drugs, MCI WorldCom, Republic Services, a company that specializes in solid waste management in Sun Belt states, should realize significant earning within 4 years. Brian's final suggestion for investment was U.S. Government issued bonds.

We look forward to having Brian with us in 2001.

#### Program:

In an effort to help Richmond Rotarians keep up their civic duty, DAVID BROWN put together a "meet the candidates" program. Candidates for Judge of the Superior Court John M. Starr, Joel Golub and Dan O'Malley appeared at Richmond Rotary. Each candidate had five minutes to make a statement concerning his candidacy. John Starr, who is in private practice, used the bulk of his five minutes to discuss Propositions 30 and 31 (insurance measures) which are designed to strengthen the Fair Insurance Practices Act. HERB COLE had the honors of introducing Antoinette Henry-Evans. Antoinette is already known to many Richmond Rotarians because she is Principal of Peres School which Rotary "adopted" this year.

Antoinette is most appreciative of the projects that Rotary has undertaken on behalf of the school. It is becoming clear that the school is a community center and fills a role that goes beyond classroom teaching and learning. Some of the programs now underway at Peres School arc:



- \* Career Day which involves Richmond's private and public sector agencies and companies in a presentation of jobs. The police, fire departments, East Bay M.U.D. are examples of this program.
- \* School Fix Up Day which began in 1999 and will expand in 2000 to include Rotary's contributions. Of particular note is the Peres School Garden which was an outgrowth of the Fix Up Day. The garden grows vegetables, herbs and flowers and introduces children from urban backgrounds to an entirely new environment.
- \* Peres Dental Clinic brought about through the leadership of Dr. DAN TANITA. Six hundred children from Peres School will receive dental exams, consultations, fluoride cleanings, sealants and education at the clinic built and operated within the Peres School.
- \*Reading programs which include adults reading to kids as well as time set aside each time for reading are now part of the daily routine at Peres School. The programs are designed to foster a love of reading in young people as well as improvement on reading tests. There are several awards programs tied to reading projects.
- \* Peres School has worked hard on developing ongoing discipline among all of its students. Creating a culture of better student behavior has resulted in significant reduction in problems among the students. Peres is also putting together a peer mediation program which will enhance the culture of good student conduct.

\* Peres Healthy Start Collaborative which is designed to foster better health among resident living in the Peres School vicinity.

Antoinette turned the program over to DIANE BECTON SMITH who is Richmond Rotary's coordinator of the Spirit of Excellence project at Peres. The Spirit of Excellence program is designed to foster individual excellence in young students. The rewards for ongoing participation include a week at summer camp as well as other prizes awarded during the year. Richmond Rotary has made a significant financial commitment to the success of this program.

There are many exciting projects in the works, and Richmond Rotary looks forward to developing its relationship with Peres School.



Program:

GLORIA JOHNSTON, Superintendent of W.C.C.U.S.D. introduced Vince Kilmartin, Asst. Supt. for Support Services and Anna Blackman, Regional Supt. for Schools in South Richmond, El Cerrito and Kensington.

Mr. Kilmartin, after a long and distinguished career with the military joined the WCCUSD in the fall of 1999. He has oversight for a number of programs including but not limited to facilities management, school policing, meals, new construction, transportation. Vince identified several

construction and maintenance projects that have been undertaken by the school district over the past 10 years. He commended the cooperative efforts between the district and the City of Richmond on the completion of the new swim center adjoining the Kennedy High School. His comments were highlighted by a description of the new Richmond Middle School slated for construction on the site formerly occupied by the Harry Ells High School. The new school will cost approximately \$30 million. The Harry Ells High School which was built in the 1940's cost almost \$1 million. The school incorporates all of the features of a modern educational facility incorporating classrooms, libraries and administration in a combined program. Groundbreaking for the new school is scheduled for April 4th. Demolition of the old school will occur during Spring of 2000 and new construction should commence summer/fall of 2000. The new school should open in 2002.

Anna Blackman has been with the educational system in Richmond for 30 years. She is well equipped to implement a new curriculum for the new middle school. The school is fully equipped to handle new technology as well as more traditional classes. Students who attend this school should receive their educations in classes of fewer students inasmuch as the new school will bring much needed relief to the overcrowding now identified in the 3 existing middle schools in the district.

Rotary commends Dr. Johnston, Mr. Kilmartin and Ms. Blackman as they move forward in improving educational opportunities in Richmond.

#### "West Contra Costa Unified School District Strategic Planning"

GLORIA L. JOHNSTON, Ph.D. Superintendent of Schools

The West Contra Costa Unified School District encompasses the cities of El Cerrito, Richmond, San Pablo, Pinole, and Hercules as well as several unincorporated areas within its 110 square mile area. Nearly 34,000 students are enrolled in preschool through grade 12 in 59 schools. The annual general fund budget exceeds \$200 million, and the District has nearly 4,000 employees.

While working for school districts in California and Illinois, Gloria has been a district-level administrator in the areas of bilingual education, curriculum development, student assessment, state and federal categorical programs, preschool services, and human relations. She also worked as a teacher and principal in schools in Illinois and spent three years teaching English as a second language in Caracas, Venezueia.

Gloria received her A.A. degree from Elgin Community College, her B.S. and M.S. degrees from Northern Illinois University, and her Ph.D. in Public Policy Analysis from the University of Illinois at Chicago. Her doctoral dissertation was a study of the work of public school superintendents.



Program:

Jeff Nathanson had the honor of introducing Larry Wright a.k.a. "Zappo the Magician". In the tradition of the three greatest lies, Larry introduced himself this way, "The check is in the mail; this won't hurt at all (directed at the dentist's table) and I'm from the IRS and I am here to help". Yes, Larry is the Public Affairs Officer for the Northern California Internal Revenue Service District. This was Larry's second time before the Richmond Rotary. He came voluntarily.

Larry regaled the Rotarians with stories from IRS customers. For example, he read an IRS letter that had been written in taxalese with a request written to the President that the IRS provide translation services. Every now and then, the IRS will send letters to individuals who have left for parts unknown. One of those letters prompted a suggestion that if the IRS is having trouble locating missing taxpayers perhaps they could improve the return rate by putting pictures of missing taxpayers on the side of milk containers much like the pictures of missing children. Although the IRS is not putting pictures of missing taxpayers on milk containers, they are now posting pictures of missing children on some of their publications. After all the IRS is all inclusive. Bureaus which deal with missing and abused children report that the service has increased the number of leads received. Larry recounts the story of one San Francisco man who wanted to increase his deduction because of depreciation on his breeding horse. Turns out the horse was a gelding. About 2 years ago, IRS, in response to the Presidential requirements, held public hearings in Washington concerning customer service. The reports were less than complimentary. As a result, the IRS is now undergoing it's largest reorganization since 1954. In order to gain efficiencies as well as for IRS agents to develop deep subject expertise, IRS will be divided into four subagencies which will specialize in particular categories of taxpayers. The groups are:

\*tax exempt organizations

- \*organizations and companies with income in excess of \$5
- \* wage and investment income
- \*small business and self-employed individuals

Auditing will also be done on a divisional basis. These changes are set to occur October 1, 2000, with full implementation in place by 2002. Larry, we are glad you came to Rotary, and you did help!





#### CHARLES E. RAMSEY Assistant Basketball Coach U.C. Berkeley

Charles E. Ramsey, regarded as one of the young up-and-coming basketball coaches in the country due to his abilities both in recruiting and on the floor, is in his fourth season as an assistant coach at California. In his first year at Cal, Ramsey was instrumental in helping the Bears post their best overall record since 1960 (23-9), as they reached the Sweet 16 of the 1997 NCAA Tournament.

Prior to arriving in Berkeley, Ramsey was a member of Ben Braun's staff during two different stints at Eastern Michigan. A 1991 graduate of EMU, he first served under Braun as an assistant coach from 1990-93, including the 1990-91 season when the Eagles captured the MAC championship and also advanced to the Sweet 16. Ramsey then coached one year as an assistant at Tennessee State, helping the team to a 19-11 record, an Ohio Valley Conference title and berth in the NCAA Tournament. From there, Ramsey went to Drake University for two seasons, serving as associate coach. He returned to Eastern Michigan in April of 1996 before making the trip to Berkeley with Braun in the fall of '96.

In addition to his collegiate experience, Ramsey also has coached extensively on the high school level, with five seasons as an assistant boys' basketball coach at Ypsilanti HS in Michigan from 1982-87. He was head coach of Team Michigan, a squad consisting of top college prospects in Michigan. A native of Ypsilanti, Michigan, Ramsey attended Fisk University, where he was a member of the basketball team from 1979-81 and earned conference all-freshman honors. At Easter Michigan, Ramsey received a bachelor's degree in sociology. He is a member of the National Association of Basketball Coaches and is a lifetime member of the Basketball Coaches Association of Michigan.

ERLE BROWN is delighted that Michigan State University won the NCAA basketball tournament. BILL REID is pleased with his move to the new farm in Petaluma. DAVID BROWN is grateful for his medical plan. JOE GREEN is happy to be back in Richmond after a very uneventful trip to Charlotte, NC.

#### Program:

DOUGLAS STRAUS had the honors of introducing our guest speaker, Attorney Joshua Genser. Joshua introduced himself as chair of the Richmond Blue Ribbon Panel on Wastewater Management. He attained that lofty position by being the Chamber of Commerce's representative to the Panel as well as being a rare individual on the panel who also lives in the Richmond wastewater district.

In the fall of 1999, the City of Richmond authorized a \$40 million act for upgrading and improving the City's aging wastewater operations. There are two major aspects of this act. One is the collection of water and the other is treatment. As part of the act, the City Council appointed



a Blue Ribbon Committee with the responsibility of reviewing the operations and reporting if the increase in sewer fees could be justified. The Panel was able to determine that the Wastewater Facility on Canal was in need of upgrade because in rainy seasons, its capacity is overwhelmed. Furthermore, backups in older parts of the City are common occurrences. This part of the study was relatively quick in determining because access to the plant is easy. On the other hand, reviewing the piping system throughout Richmond has been difficult. There has never been a comprehensive study of the sewers, pipes and their viability. Nevertheless, the Panel was able to determine that much of the system was in bad condition and in need of repair or replacement. The fees are in line with the work that needs to be done.

Along the way, the Panel reviewed options besides raising fees. These included: partnering with East Bay Municipal Utility District for wastewater treatment which is politically problematical because of rates assessed to other municipalities in the district; establishing flexible rates for service as opposed to fixed rates which is virtually impossible to do because of the significant differences in how various agencies or residences use water; and privatization of the plant. The Panel's work was to be completed with the review of the fees question. However, the Panel has been asked to work on a request for information with the City's Public Services Department and review the results pending a final decision on the privatization of the City's wastewater plant.

Joshua reported that he learned more about wastewater treatment than he thought he ever wanted to know. He also learned that sewage pooling can be incestuous; the City's water collection system is in bad shape; and that working with attorneys who are involved in wastewater questions can lead to a few lunches.

Joshua managed to do a very good job making the topic interesting. Furthermore, the person who thought that wastewater treatment would make for a good after dinner program must be a genius.



Joe Canciamilla brings an exciting range of experience to public service. Combining a background in business and the legal profession, Canciamilla has served more than 25 years as an elected official official representing constituents in east Contra Costa County.

Born and raised in Pittsburg, Canciamilla began his public service early. At the age of 17, while still a senior in high school, Canciamilla won election to a seat on the Pittsburg Board of education, becoming the youngest elected official in the country. Canciamilla served four consecutive terms before moving on to win a seat on the Pittsburg City Council where he served two terms, including two years as Mayor. In March of 1996 Joe was elected to the Contra Costa Board of Supervisors where he currently represents the Fifth District.

While on the Board of Supervisors Joe Canciamilla has proven to be an effective leader and consensus builder. Over the past two years he helped craft a cutting edge industrial safety ordinance, led the new growth management effort in the County, and is the leading proponent of a sub-regional strategic plan to deal with growth and its impacts.

The Center uses these keys in its programs starting in Pre-School with the "HIPPY" Plan. Hippy stands for "Home Instruction Program for Preschool Youth." The Center believes that the parent is a child's first teacher and that a strong early education foundation will help to insure a happy childhood. HIPPY is just one of the many programs The Center offers at its location in the Shields Reed Community Center in Richmond.

In addition to preventative programs, the Center assists through intervention. The Center provides pro bono mediation services which can be used as an alternative to small claims court. The Center will help neighbors resolve disputes; families to find ways to work together; and mediate problems amongst various citizen groups.

The Center relies heavily on community input and is looking for volunteers to serve on its Board of Directors. Anyone interested in volunteering should contact Jim Becker at 510-234-5359. The Center provides a valuable service throughout California. We appreciate its efforts.

Tom Torlakson began his service as the District representative in 1996 and was re-elected in 1998. During his first term in the Assembly, Tom became a leader in education and public safety while fighting for transportation improvements and a balance between jobs and affordable housing. Legislative achievements:

- Succeeded in writing a law that regulates permanent amusement park rides to provide greater safety for California's families as we visit our State's amusement parks.
- Passed a law which provides \$150 million to mitigate some of the burden borne by local governments from the property tax shift of the early 90's and \$425 million for the state's infrastructure bank to fund road improvements, water treatment and other infrastructure.
- Authored the largest school construction and improvement bond in California history \$9.2 billion to build desperately needed new classroom, repair deteriorating school facilities and make schools computer-ready.
- Passed a law to accelerate the development and delivery of state and local transportation projects and makes more efficient use of funds in the Account.
- Co-authored legislation that placed the water bond and parks bond on the March ballot
- Recognizing the dire need for improvements to our library system, he co-authored a bill on the March 2000 ballot to provide \$350 million for new library buildings.
- Secured over \$1 million to develop and fund the first phase of the Delta Science Center.
- Wrote the law that provides for after-school programs for over 85,000 kindergarten through 9th grade students so these students have additional time to learn in a safe, supervised place between the house of 3-6 pm-the prime time for juvenile crime.

advice. JOE is proud to announce that his good (no name given) friend has been elected President of the club in Whidbey Island.

Program: Judge JONI HIRAMOTO introduced Rolanda Pierre Dixon who is Deputy District Attorney for Santa Clara County. In 1991, Ms. Pierre was responsible for creating the first Domestic Violence Unit in that county. She has headed that operation since its inception and is one of California's leading experts on domestic violence. Some of the nuggets pulled from her presentation are:

- Domestic violence is the outgrowth of one individual's compelling need to control another. Ms. Pierre-Dixon drew a graphic picture of the painful downward spiral that relationships take when control is the motivating factor in the relationship.
- Domestic violence is finally being recognized as a community issue that impacts everyone not just family members. It has been a long and difficult effort to convince officials and citizens of that reality but we are finally making inroads in dealing with this serious problem.
- Ms. Dixon and her team established a protocol for dealing with domestic violence. Simply stated, if one is caught committing an act of domestic violence, he will be arrested. Police are directed to make arrests and court officers will deal with matters of intervention. This protocol reduces the number of repeat visits police must make to scenes of domestic violence and children are taken out of the line of fire more effectively.
- Most victims are reluctant, even afraid, to disclose that they have been abused. Nevertheless, police and medical records, when one suspects domestic violence, can be released and action can and will be taken.

- Domestic violence is an equal opportunity crime. There are cases of women battering men and men battering women. Cases cross all demographic lines -- age, race and national origin are represented. Ms. Pierre-Dixon and her team deal with about 65 cases per month. Perhaps the saddest example given dealt with domestic violence against pregnant women.
- ·Although it is very difficult, very intense and sometimes very depressing, it is everyone's responsibility to deal with domestic violence.

Thanks to her team and other teams around the State, improvements in dealing with domestic violence are being realized. We appreciate Ms. Pierre-Dixon's leadership.



DAVID BROWN, incoming chair of the membership committee, is happy that DONNA has the wisdom to wait until his term begins. DON LAU is happy that his year as President is coming to an end, but even happier that Jordan had a great year in school, made wonderful progress in Tai Kwan Do and does lots of things that makes his dad very proud.

Program:

"American Concentration Camps: How Could It Have Happened" was introduced by JONI HIRAMOTO. In her very moving opening remarks, JONI pointed out this topic is a particulary difficult one because she has a personal relationship with those who were interred during World War II. Both of her parents were placed in the camps simply for being Japanese-Americans. For many years, her parents would not talk about this harrowing time in their lives. However, with the success of the Korematsu case, individuals who were at the camps started to tell of their experiences at places like Manzanar and Topaz and Tanforan in San Bruno. Diffuclt though it may be, JONI reminded us that we have an obligation to learn and to remember so these events will not occur again.

Our guest speaker was Bill Hirose who is a docent at the Japanese-American Historical Society. With remarkable grace and good will, Bill related the experience of the cmaps and the memories they hold for him. Some of the points that Bill brought to our attention included:

\*Of the 120,000 individuals of Japanese ancestry imprisoned in the camps, 70 percent were American citizens. The rest were mostly their parents who were permanent residents ineligible for citizenship due to discriminatory laws based on ancestry. Even though some of these people had been in America since Forty-niner days, they were excluded from owning property as participating in "normal" activities. Detainment in the camps was the ultimate discrmination.

\*There was a certain irony in that even though Japanese-Americans were held in camps, many of their children were drafted to fight in WWII. The all-Japanese combat regimental team became the most decorated unit in US military history. Perhaps to show their bravery, their loyalty or that they could be "more American", the soldiers of the "Do or Die 442" gave more lives to the cause than any other units.

\*It was only by 1988 that Japanese-Americans received an official apology from the US government for the injustice performed by one group of Americans against another group of fellow citiznes. The Karematsu case, brought by Bill's legal colleague Dale Minami, also made small financial restitution to those who have been in the

\*Bill shared an essay that he wrote when he was in the 8th grade. It is a bittersweet statement about his feelings about America and being in the camps. He said, "then I would stroll around looking at the sights which I did not enjoy so good before...After this, I would get my old job. With my trusty camera I would go to the Presidio and get a few shots at the new cannons."

In keeping with Richmond Rotary's goal of education, Bill taught us a great deal. We should all take the time to visit the Japanese American National Museum.

pull an orange ping-pong ball out of an opaque bag which, the first week, has a total of 17 white balls and one orange one. Each week that the orange one remains in the bag, the white one that was pulled will be set aside, increasing the changes of getting the orange as the week pass. The person who pulls the orange one wins ½ of the "pot", that is, the accumulation of the raffle revenue; the other ½ goes to the club coffers. LESLIE sweetened the pot with a \$50 donation. Adding the raffle revenue for the day, the total now is \$85. Average weekly revenue is \$35-\$40, so you do the math and buy more tickets! The goal is to raise more club funds because, under the old system, we took in only about \$5 a week.

#### Program

Colin Brady gave his second presentation at our club. He is now the Animation Director at George Lucas' Industrial Light and Magic (ILM). Colin gave a fascinating comparison of two tycoons: Steve Jobs and George Lucas. Steve is an overbearing, powerful visionary, whereas George is shy, almost a recluse. Colin prefers to work for George. Steve Jobs has a 50/50 deal with Disney, whereas, George Lucas gets paid for the special effects his company contributes to motion pictures. When Pixar has such huge successes with Toy Story movies, which made hundreds of millions of

dollars, then it is obvious that Pixar profited more than what ILM can get for its contracts. Colin presented a video which showed how computer animators use humans for modeling characters by attaching electronic nodes on bodies. That gives animators clues how individuals move their bodies. Colin said that we have the technology now, which would make it possible to bring back John Wayne, or Marilyn Monroe animated images to the screen and that no one would know the difference. The point, however, would be what kind of story or role they would play which would interest the public. Also, with the help of software like MAYA, which costs \$7,000 and a Mac or other computer that costs \$2,000, anyone could make a Hollywood-quality movie. A good example is the movie "Matrix" which won four Oscars. Colin concluded that glory belongs to him who finds the better story.

Program:

Judge JONI HIRAMOTO introduced Mark Simons, Presiding Judge of Contra Costa County. Judge Simons was appointed to Contra Costa Superior Court by Governor Wilson in 1995. Judge Simons presented Richmond Rotary with an overview of how the court system has changed in Contra Costa County in the last few years. In particular the Judge identified two major changes which are:

1. The creation of one Superior Court for the entire county. Courts in the County used to be segmented and very little coordination concerning cases took place. This structure created unnecessary delays; uneven distribution of workloads; and lack of flexibility in assigning cases. Unification has brought about a more responsive court system that is able to deal withvariations of trials more effectively.

2. Courts used to rely on counties as primary source of funding. In recent years, a shift from county budget to the State's budget has occurrred. This funding change has enabled the County's courts to grow in size to match the County's ever increasing population and of course increased workload. Also, the funding source into a robust State budget provides the dollars needed to take advantage of technology that will bring efficiencies to the Courts. Contra Costa County's Courts are installing new technologies at a rapid pace and the citizens are gaining benefits from these upgrades of operations.

Judge Simons finished by pointing out that these are very exciting times to be a Judge in California because so many positive events are occurring. At the time, he sometimes feels that he has received the dual cursing/blessing from the Chinese, "May you live in interesting times."



Program: JOE GREEN introduced Donna Graves. Project Manager for the Rosie the Riveter and WWII Homefront National Historical Park. Donna gave an overview of the project with highlights that included the following:

\*Two years ago then Councilwoman Donna Graves asked Congressman George Miller for help in gaining landmark status for a Rosie the Riveter Memorial. That request has grown into an ambitious project which could lead to a new "Rosie the Riveter/WWII Homefront National Historical Park" which incorporates the former Kaiser Shipyards along Richmond's waterfront and additional historic resources elsewhere in the City. Our fellow Rotarian, TOM BUTT is now leading the way for creation of the National Park.

\*Part of the project includes a Rosie the Riveter memorial which will be dedicated in October. The design, chosen from a national competition, evokes

the scale of the ships built in Richmond. Particularly intriguing is the use of ladders which will include historic photos placed in spaces between the rungs of the ladder. The artist team of Susan Schwartzenberg and Cheryl Barton are responsible for the concept and design of the memorial.

\* The Postal Service honored the contributions of women working in shipyards with a postage stamp issued in Richmond. The stamp has the well known theme of "We Can Do It".

\*The project includes an oral history and educational components all designed to teach the young people of Richmond the rich history they have inherited and need to know.

\* The Red Oak Victory ship restoration works very closely with the Rosie program and will be a part of the National Park.

It is an exciting time to be in Richmond. Thanks to Donna's strong interest and skill, Rosie the Riveter and all of the efforts of those who worked on the Homefront will be memorialized in Richmond. What better place?



- \* Masquers presents 5 productions per year. 2 musicals and 3 dramas or comedies are offered. In the course of each year, more than 10,000 individuals see a Masquer's presentation. Pat Nelson estimates that about 8,000 new faces are in the audiences each year. In addition to the mainstream performances, Masquers presents its "Envisions" program. "Envisions" provides the community with an opportunity to see avant garde and new plays in a nearby venue. The shows can be daring, provocative and exciting.

JUDY KAFKA introduced DONNA URIYU, Marketing Manager for the Richmond Redevelopment Authority. The Great State of Wyoming's gift to the great City of Richmond is also a member of Richmond Rotary. We think JUDY was suffering from convention watching overload. DONNA has a fascinating biography which has prepared her well for the responsibilities of her job in Richmond.

DONNA's presentation centered on economic development in Richmond. She pointed out that many cities have a wide variety of tools available to stimulate and sustain development. Richmond's basic tool has been the resources of the Redevelopment Authority, which used about \$50 million to bring about nearly a billion dollars in new and planned development. The City of Richmond also is in a position to see significant growth because of the factors such as:

- \* 32 miles of shoreline. More shoreline than any other city in the Bay Area.
- \* Large tracts of affordable land. This is some of the last available space large enough to support development of facilities of several 100 square feet.
- \* A city which encourages development and installed policies and procedures to expedite the development progress.
- \* A development philosophy of mixed residential development.

- \* The restoration and renovation of the old Ford Plant by Forest City Developers. This 500,000 square foot building at the site of Port #3 will include live/work lofts, commercial space and the Visitors Center for the proposed Rosie the Riveter/World War II Home Front National Park. This project along will cost in excess of \$100 million.
- \* In downtown Richmond a new Transit Village located at the site of the Bart/Amtrak station will bring new housing and new commercial opportunists along Macdonald Avenue. The Main Street project in the same area will improve the appearance of the storefronts on what is considered Richmond's "Main Street".
- \* The Richmond Parkway, which will completed this year, is a corridor, which links I-580 to I-80. Construction of several new commercial and light industry facilities has begun in this area.
- \* An example of a company that recognized the advantages of moving to Richmond is Daikon. This fiber optic company is building a 400,000 square foot facility in the Marina Bay Area. When completed this operation will employ more than 2,000 individuals and will act as a catalyst for bringing other high tech companies to Richmond.
- \* In addition to the commercial development, Richmond is seeing a burst of new residential construction. Houses spanning the price ranges can be seen under construction along the Richmond Parkway, the Marina Bay area, and parts of Point Richmond.

There are many other examples that DONNA brought to our attention.

This is an exciting time to be working and living in Richmond. It appears that the hard work of so many individuals and organizations, including the Redevelopment Authority are finally paying dividends.



#### Program:

RICH BRANDES' exuberant introduction of the program enabled DAN SANDERS, the day's program chair, with an opportunity to take a short amount of stage time. Our guest speaker for the day was Lois Boyle. Lois is the President of the Richmond Museum association. She has been active in a wide variety of community affairs in Richmond for more than 3 decades. Her special interest now is the Red Oak Victory Ship. Lois presented an update on the story of the ship's ongoing restoration.

Lois pointed out that the story began in the early 1990's when Congress passed legislation authorizing scraping of ships in mothball fleets. The Red Oak Victory was one of those ships. The Museum Association set about to save the ship because it had been built in Richmond and held a special place in the heart and history of the City. The Association petitioned the U.S. Navy, with the support of Congressman George Miller, to convey the Red Oak Victory to Richmond. After significant work by the Museum Association, the ship was conveyed in 1996. In 1998, the Red Oak Victory was returned to Richmond where she is moored at Terminal One in Point Richmond. But, that is just the beginning. Since the relocation from Mare Island to Terminal, a volunteer group has been hard at work attempting to return the ship to its sailing shape. The booms, which were rusting relics in 1998, have been scraped and painted. They have been reinstalled and are now working. The galleys have been repaired and the captain's quarters are nearing completion. To date more than 40,000 hours of volunteer service have been offered. There is much work left to be done. Significant projects include restoring the hull; making the engines functional; and turning the lower

decks into museum space. Several individuals are involved in raising the large amount of money that will be needed to complete the work that Lois identified in her presentation. Lois reported that Rotarians RICH BRANDES, DON HARDISON and ERLE BROWN are to be commended for their efforts on behalf of the ship.

The Red Oak Victory will become part of the Rosie the Riveter/World War II Homefront National Historical Park. She will be birthed near the Ford Plant which will house the Park's visitors center. The Association and the City of Richmond have reached an agreement concerning finding a permanent home for the Red Oak Victory. The Red Oak Victory is the last of her kind and the last remaining Victory ship to have been built in Richmond. Thanks to the hard work of the Association, led by Lois Boyle, generations of Americans have a legacy that can be appreciated and enjoyed.





#### Program:



Born in Oakland, California, in 1930, Jim DeWitt's career has never veered from his two loves - sailing and art. As a five year old, he drew pictures of the sailboat his father was building in their backyard - and dreamed of someday being her skipper. After high school, he studied art for six years at the California College of Arts and Crafts and Los Angeles Art Center – learning sail making and racing sailboats in his spare time.

In the busy years since, he has gained international renown as both an artist and a winning yachtsman. Racing in everything from eight-foot El Toro dinghies to blue-water yachts, he has won an impressive array of national and international trophies. overlooking Havana. It has an oil refinery as well as other blue-collar industries. 35% of its population is of African descent. It is an older city that has an infrastructure in need of serious repair. Most importantly, the people are warm and welcoming. It was easy to understand why the group felt at ease during their visit.

Jacques Bronson, President of Athletes United for Peace, is a professional film maker. Jacques was a part of the team that visited Regla. He showed a video, still in production, of various aspects of the trip. Highlights included the reading of a proclamation from Richmond to Regla and from Regla to Richmond; visits to schools and medical centers; interviews with elected officials; and the delegation enjoying themselves just by being very good citizen diplomats.

Linda Harris from the Richmond City Manager's staff discussed the terms and conditions which made the trip possible. Richmond's careful attention to all of the intricacies in gaining permission to visit Cuba is exemplary. Many cities with larger staffs and more powerful politicians have not succeeded with the aplomb shown by Richmond. In particular, Linda pointed out the large amount of medical equipment and supplies that the delegation brought and the interesting way that the group was able to bring it into Cuba.

Irma Anderson concluded the presentation by reminding us the trip was organized to foster good will, open dialogue, share common goals for the population, and bring humanitarian aid to the community. In many ways, the goals of this delegation sounded very much like the goals of Rotary International

#### Program:

JUDY KAFKA introduced the day's speaker, Roberta Shaw, an art historian, with degrees from both Stanford and Berkeley. She has visited Russia repeatedly both before and after the dissolution of the USSR.

She chose on this day to focus primarily on Russian art in Moscow, particularly in and around the Kremlin. She pointed out that the Kremlin is not the grim, forbidding place it appeared to be during the Cold War as the Soviet leaders reviewed military parades from atop Lenin's tomb. Although it remains the seat of Russian government, many of the palaces built during the time of the Tsars are now open to the public. Many of these buildings had historic and ceremonial significance. The magnificence of their interior decoration was made evident by the slides that Roberta showed to illustrate her talk. During the Soviet era, particularly under Stalin, religious buildings were secularized and became museums. Some churches were razed and their contents consigned to museums or even sold to collectors. Under the new regime, many of these buildings have been restored and now serve their original function. Some of those that were destroyed have been rebuilt.

As Roberta's talk moved out of the Kremlin and onto Red Square, we learned that the Russian word for "red" does not refer to Communism but instead it means "beautiful", and thus the name of the square remains.

#### Program:

BART WALLACE introduced Shirley Fudge-Mueller of PG&E. Shirley is a major account representative at PG&E. She represents the utility to large commercial customers.

Shirley used this opportunity to address various issues facing both PG&E and its customers. She recapped recent events which have brought significant increases in the cost of energy to utility consumers in California. How did we get to this point: ?

\*State's energy demand is up by over 30% while generation is up by only 6%.

\*1996 deregulation discouraged power plant ownership by California utilities.

\*Wholesale generation prices rose in the summer of 2000 to levels that are much higher then the same period in 1999. In some places in California, one-kilowatt hour cost 75 cents whereas the normal price is 10 cents per hour.

\*PG&E had not raised its rates since 1993 so when the demand spiked in 2000, the utility was ill prepared to deal with the impact. Elevated costs for the utility may continue to remain above any rates that could be frozen. Since, May 2000, PG&E has amassed about \$3.4 billion in uncollected electricity costs – incurred in buying power on the wholesale market for its customers.

So what can be done to get costs under control? Shirley identified the following: Reduce demand through conservation and better technology. PG&E offers a variety of rebate plans to individuals and companies that are willing to install various kinds of timers, thermostats, etc., designed to maximize

economies. Encourage increase supply through construction and expansion. Cap wholesale prices until the market is fixed and develop a fair rate stability plan. PG&E has introduced a rate stabilization plan, which if enacted, would set a starting rate of 6.5 cents per kilowatt-hours for electric energy consumption. The proposal would provide a way to begin to pay down this past summer's uncollected wholesale energy costs very gradually and overtime.

Shirley brought a complex subject to our attention and encouraged all Rotarians to learn as much as they possibly can about energy conservation.
